Faith Builders has a warehouse filled with needed items, a transitional living home for 5 women, and 28 respite care homes who care for children when parents need assistance with child rearing. Andrea also teaches parenting classes which include how to deal with the court system. Andrea left us with the thought "one small thing can make a huge difference in someone's life".

Church Spotlight The Hospitality of Jesus

Hello Ladies,

The Fall of 2022 the Outreach Committee at First Baptist Church of Ottawa, Kansas started exploring ways we could reach out to the entire community of Ottawa and meet needs. One way we explored was possibly starting a community meal to be served one time a month. We gathered information about the need and whether it was being met any other way in Ottawa. After compiling that information, the Outreach Committee decided to proceed forward and made plans to start serving meals the 4th Thursday of each month beginning in March. The planning for these meals was coordinated with the Fellowship Committee as they helped plan and

prepare the meals.

We wanted to provide a welcoming atmosphere for people to enter each time the meal was served. Since this was a new ministry for our church, we applied for a grant from the American Baptist Churches of the Central Region. With the help of a \$1,000 grant dinnerware was purchased on which food would be served. The grant also helped purchase food for the meals during 2023. Place settings were put on each table with paper placemats and silverware for each person. A basket of crayons was placed in the middle of each table. A sign was placed with them telling all who came to feel free to leave a message on the placemat and draw any pictures they would like. The food was served by members of our church and desserts and drinks were provided on a separate table.

We had 25 friends come to share a meal with our members in March of 2023. We had between 15 and 20 of our members come and sit with our friends to share a meal and conversation. We also sent meals to go with some people who didn't want to stay or came and needed additional food. The program has grown each month with 41 coming to share a meal or get food to go in the month of August. We have also had several pictures and messages left on the placemats. Those are now being displayed on one of the walls in Elliott Hall at First Baptist Church. Since starting this program we have also been able to help some of our friends secure bicycles for transportation

and get utility bills paid so they can have utilities to their residences. Our goal for the future is to continue serving the meal and growing the number of people who attend. It has been a blessing for our church and hopefully the entire community. As a result of this program and many other things taking place in our church, the local newspaper selected First Baptist Church as the "Best Place to Worship" in Franklin County for 2023. Matthew 25:40 tells us the "whatever you have done for the least of these, my brother, you have done to me." First Baptist Church of Ottawa is seeking to do that through our Thankful Thursday meal.

"As Christians, we are commanded through scripture to follow the example of Jesus Christ," Pastor Randy Moravec, Gypsum First Baptist Church, said. The four denominational offerings were advertised in the Central Connection and encouraged women to share in their own churches.

News from Global Servants was shared in the Central Connection along with special celebrations. Churches were encouraged to invite our Global Servants when they were in the U.S. and Missionaries to visit and become acquainted with that local church.

The women did very well in some areas and not so well in others. There were many other donations, etc. to local areas that are not reported. Some are really busy ladies. As far as I could tell, the international goal of \$12,000 for the Gutierrez received about half-\$6,170. Women and their churches were very generous with money and items purchased. Each one must be commended for their efforts to help others!

About 35 churches reported and no new churches came on line. The persons working on the requests included 337 women, 58 men, five youth, and 16 reported their entire church helped. For the Region projects, Bethel Neighborhood Center, and Murrow Indian Children's Home, 55.4 pounds were mailed at a cost of \$207.96. The estimated value of the items was \$6,378.48.

The \$6,170 was sent to International Ministries. Four churches reported holding a dedication. Included are projects from Matthew 25:35–36. Most appeared to b what was already happening and next year they will be encouraged to have new projects.



RESOLVING CONFLICT IN A CHRISTLIKE MANNER

Conflict is a part of life that we all encounter. Whether it's within our families, communities, churches, it's inevitable. However, as followers of Christ, we are called to approach conflict in a way that reflects His teachings and character. How many times have we tried to ignore conflict or worse, seen conflict ignite with no clear plan on how to resolve it, especially in a Christlike manner?

Scripture: Matthew 5:9 (NIV) "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called Children of God."

Understanding the Source of Conflict: Conflicts often arise from differences in opinions, misunderstandings, or unmet expectations. It's essential to identify the source of the conflict to address it effectively. Remember that our struggle is not against flesh and blood but against spiritual forces. (Ephesians 6:12).

Seek Peace: In the Beatitudes, Jesus teaches that peacemakers are blessed.

As Christ's followers, we

should actively seek peace and reconciliation in our relationships. This means going the extra mile to resolve conflicts, even if we believe we are not entirely at fault. (Matthew 5:23-24)

Practice Active Listening:Christlike conflict resolution involves active listening.

James 1:19 advises us to be quick to listen, slow to speak, and slow to become angry.When we truly listen to others we gain a better understanding of their perspective and feelings, which can lead to resolving conflict.

Forgiveness: One the of the central teachings of Jesus is forgiveness. He forgave those who crucified Him, setting an example for us all. In conflicts, be willing to forgive and ask for forgiveness if necessary.


PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT RESOLVING CONFLICT IN A CHRISTLIKE MANNER

Humility: Philippians 2:3-4 reminds us to do nothing out of selfish ambition and to consider others better than ourselves. To be Christlike, one must approach conflicts with a humble heart, willing to admit your own faults and shortcomings. This humility can often ease tense situations and open the door to resolution.

Prayer: In all circumstances, including conflicts, turn to prayer. Seek God's wisdom and guidance in finding a peaceful resolution. Pray for the other person(s) involved, asking God to work in their hearts as well.

Solving conflicts in a Christlike manner in not always easy, but it is a necessary and beneficial to living out our faith. The next time you are involved in a conflict, even when the others involved do not seem to practice any of the above mentioned resolution techniques, you will model a Christlike attitude even in what seems an impossible conflict situation.

The Book of the Month

The Bible Book of the Month of October is I Corinthians. I Corinthians was written by the Apostle Paul to the Christian community in Corinth. The letter addresses various issues and concerns within the Corinthian church, and it contains several key takeaways and teachings. Here are some of the main themes and takeaways from 1 Corinthians:

Unity in the Church: Paul emphasizes the importance of unity among believers in the church. He urges them to be of one mind and avoid divisions and quarrels.

The Resurrection Body: Paul explores the nature of the resurrection body and its differences from the earthly body. He explains that believers will receive transformed, imperishable bodies in the resurrection.

The Wisdom of God: Paul contrasts the wisdom of God with the wisdom of the world, emphasizing that God's wisdom often appears foolish to the world but is actually wiser and more profound.

Evangelism: Paul discusses the importance of presenting the Gospel message clearly and persuasively to both Jews and Greeks, adapting his approach to the audience.

These are some of the key takeaways and themes found in 1 Corinthians. The letter addresses various practical and theological issues faced by the early Christian community in Corinth and provides valuable guidance for contemporary Christians as well.
